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Ruckus in House; Chair ignores division demand since all members were not in their seats; Oppn says govt did not have the numbers

Snocker as RS rams two farm bills by voice vote

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TWO of the three contentious farm bills were passed in the Kajva Sabha by voice vote on Sinday amid pandemonium from the Opposition parties.

The Farmer's Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Bill and the Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill w.il now go to the President for his assent before they are notiried as laws.

The third bill, the Essential Commidities (Amendment) Bill, will be moved separately.

Dramatic scenes unfolded as Rajva Sabha Deputy Chairman Harivansh Narayan Singh rushed through the clauses of the two bills with Opposition MPs standing in the well of the House sloganeering, tearing copies of the bills, damaging the microphone at the podium and some climbing on to tables.

Opposition MPs also sat in protest inside the House after it was adjourned for the day, alleging that the government violated many rules to get the bills passed because it did not have the numbers.

The Centre condemned the ruckus in Parliament. "The kind of attack launched on Deputy Chairman Harivansh, who is an erudite and reputed person, is highly condemnable." Union Minister Rainath Singh said in a press conference. "There are attempts to emotionally misguide the farmers on the agriculture bills passed by Parliament," he added.

Terming it a 'watershed moment' in the history of Indian agriculture, Prime Minister

Narendra Modi said the bills will ensure a complete transformation of the farm sector.

Meanwhile, several BJP MPs demanded action against the unruly opposition lawmakers, following which Rajya Sabha Chairman Venkaiah Naidu held a meeting with the Parliamentary Affairs Minister Pralhad Joshi. Sources said the Centre is also mulling a resolution against the Opposition MPs.

The pandemonium started after the Deputy Chairman extended the duration of the House beyond 1 pm and the Opposition alleged there was no consensus for this. Following this, MPs from the TMC, Congress, DMK, AAP and others rushed to the well of the House.

TMC parliamentary party leader in Rajya Sabha Derek O'Brien flashed the rule book at the chair. While some reports said he tore it, O'Brien later denied having done so. Another member tried to pull the microphones from the podium, while marshals thwarted it.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi hailed the passage of the farm bills, calling it a 'watershed moment' in the history of Indian agriculture. He said the bills have the potential to revolutionise the farm sector. The PM asserted the bills will help double the income of farmers

DMK's Tiruchi Siva, were seen tearing copies of the bill, while Congress MP Rajiv Satav and AAP MP Sanjay Singh climbed a table in front of the chair and shouted slogans.

The noisy scenes led to adjournment of the House for 15 minutes. As the House reassembled, the Opposition resumed their protest. But the Deputy Chairman continued with the bills and they were passed by voice vote in 20 minutes. The main point raised by Opposi tion MPs was the lack of provi sion for ensuring minimum support price to farmers.
